However, the line was drawn at the 49th parallel in 1846, which is about 400 miles north of the Columbia River. The Hudson's Bay Company lost all of their claims below the 49th parallel and eventually the British moved north and founded Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada. Washington became a territory in 1853 and a state in 1889 (1). Today, Vancouver, Washington is one of the fastest growing cities in the U.S. Vancouver, British Columbia, however, is a much larger city. Several international members have told me they failed to locate Vancouver, Washington on a map. I tell them to look for Portland, Oregon (it's larger than Vancouver, Washington) and look north of the Columbia River.
